As we look back on the last 12 months, we celebrate a remarkable community of people who have brought creativity, passion and joy to our venues. From spectacular performances, to unlocking talent and potential in our classes and workshops, to the simple joy of being together sharing stories over tea and cake, our venues have delivered this every day. While these moments have taken place throughout the year, behind the scenes there has been significant change.

Somerset Council declared a financial emergency which meant that non-statutory services (including culture) faced ever-growing pressure. Our colleagues and councillors showed their passion, dedication and support for the arts to ensure our venues and service would continue to provide culture and creativity. Management of Westlands Entertainment Venue (and our staff and volunteers) transferred to Yeovil Town Council, where we are proud to be part of the new Culture, Events and Promotions directorate. Yeovil Town Council have demonstrated their ambition and commitment to ensuring our venues continue to flourish, and are there to ensure our residents benefit from excellent art, culture, leisure and heritage, that supports health and wellbeing, and attracts visitors to the area. The Arts Council England (ACE) funded National Portfolio Organisation (NPO) Arts Engagement and Outreach Programme remains with Somerset Council, and so will the new Octagon Music Hub, which will bring strategic leadership for Music Education to children and young people in Dorset and Somerset within our organisation. Despite the financial emergency, plans to develop the Octagon Theatre and see the venue reopen continue to move forward (see page 11 for a detailed update). We cannot wait to see our beloved theatre back open but do not want to miss the opportunity to develop the venue and secure its long-term future for generations

The last twelve months have certainly been a journey. Staff and volunteers have banded together by responding to challenges and opportunities with creativity, skill and dedication that makes me incredibly proud and grateful. Our guests, residents, customers and patrons have remained at the heart of what we do and, hopefully, they have not been impacted by the change and disruption happening around us.

Our biggest production of the year is always our annual pantomime, watched by around 25,000 people who make a visit to our pantomime part of their festive tradition. This year we took the production in-house, producing the show ourselves. A brand-new script, costumes, production team, and cast (with increased opportunities for South West based creatives) came together to create Jack and the Beanstalk. It proved to be a really joyous experience from start to finish and a strong debut for our first large scale production produced in-house here in Somerset.

Throughout the year, we have seen so many memorable and special moments every day. A huge thank you to all the artists, staff, volunteers, teachers, participants, audiences and guests who have found and brought so much joy to our venues and our service. I hope next year will bring many more moments of happiness and success to share.

MORE THAN JUST NUMBERS

90% of Year 12 & 13 students were more confident about a career in the creative industries after completing our week-long work experience programme.

This programme supported young people to develop key employability skills and discover how a receiving theatre operates.

100% of patrons who attended shows at our venue with support from our Accessible Ticket Scheme said they would not have been able to attend had they not received £3 tickets through the scheme.

One recipient shared: "[it has given us] a sense of belonging and being valued."

82% of students who attended our BSO GCSE Concert said it had enhanced their knowledge of GCSE music.

Hearing an orchestra perform live brought learning alive — a powerful, inspiring experience that left a lasting impact.

100% of participants who took part in our Parkinson's Dance project reported improved balance and fewer falls.

One participant shared: "I am less wobbly and less likely to fall over for several days."

100% of participants from our Time Together music-making project for new parents feeling low after the birth of their child said their mood significantly improved.

With many going on to access further support from project partners as they navigate early parenthood.

100% of artists who received our Creative Commissions grant said it positively impacted their artistry and career.

Sparking new opportunities and leading to paid work for over 80 local creatives across Somerset.



A Year of Extraordinary Entertainment at Westlands

The Octagon and Westlands have delivered another year filled with unforgettable moments. From laugh-out-loud comedy and thrilling music to captivating dance and high-energy celebrations, each performance brought people together and created lasting memories.

Audiences were treated to great live music from The Manfreds, The Drifters, The Puppini Sisters, Steeleye Span, Mugenkyo Taiko Drummers, Tony Christie and The Ukulele Orchestra of Great Britain. The thrilling harmonies of G4 and Armonico Consort filled the air, while comedians Jack Dee, Omid Djalili, Ed Gamble, Rob Beckett and Al Murray had audiences in stitches. Music lovers sang along with Man in the Mirror, Whitney Queen of the Night and That'll Be The Day. DJ Judge Jules and the Back to the 80s party nights got everyone on their feet. Highlights also included *The Nutcracker*, Andre Rieu and the Bournemouth Symphony Orchestra – delivering stunning dance and orchestral performances. The festival is a not-forprofit partnership between The Octagon Theatre and Westlands Entertainment Venue, Waterstones Yeovil, Yeovil Community Arts Association and Yeovil Library. Together, we continue to create opportunities for discovery, connection, and inspiration through literature.

THE OCTAGON THEATRE UPDATE

The Octagon Theatre remained closed through 2024-25 with many of our customers, artists and residents concerned about the future of the theatre, indeed, it was the most common comment in our recent public survey. A number of milestones were reached through 2024-25 on the development plans for the theatre.

The Octagon is owned by Somerset Council who are leading the project to develop and reopen the theatre. Somerset Council are working in partnership with Yeovil Town Council who have agreed in principle to provide funding of £3.75m towards the development. The £10m of government funding awarded to the development remains available and combined with existing fundraising, ticket levy income and other sources sees a total budget of £15m.

During the year a new architect led design team were appointed along with new project manager and cost consultant to manage the project. Our team have been working with the new design team to help them understand the building, the issues and challenges the current building faces, particularly around access, stage technical issues, lack of front of house facilities (including toilets) and general wear and tear on the building. In June 2025 the Project Board signed off RIBA II plans and RIBA III commenced.

We look forward to sharing more information with you as the project develops. We cannot wait to see The Octagon Theatre back open and welcoming guests and artists. You can keep up to date on progress with the Octagon Theatre development by visiting our website.





Jack and the Beanstalk Takes Centre Stage

In 2024, we proudly produced our first-ever in-house pantomime. For over fifty years, The Octagon's beloved pantomimes had been created by national producers. When that chapter came to a close, we saw an opportunity to take the reins ourselves and create something new for our community.

The result was Jack and the Beanstalk, a joyful celebration featuring a brand-new script, original sets and costumes, and a creative team drawn from the South West. The production gave our staff a chance to contribute their creative talents and bring something truly local and personal to the stage.

The Fine Times Recorder praised the show, saying:

"This Jack and the Beanstalk is an outstanding pantomime, telling the story, entertaining all the audience and proving once again that in theatre terms, Yeovil really is an exceptional place."

More than 21,405 people attended 38 performances, all of which received glowing reviews.

We are already looking forward to our next adventure, Beauty and the Beast, which will take to our stage this Christmas for the very first time as a professional pantomime, promising even more laughter, music and magic.







The festive season is always the busiest and most magical time for our organisation, as friends and families come together to celebrate and create unforgettable memories with us. Westlands Entertainment Venue is lit up with festive cheer, hosting a flurry of seasonal celebrations. The soldout Castaways Christmas Spectacular brought the house down, while the nostalgic Back to the 80s Christmas Party and many more events filled the venue with joy. Our incredible staff and volunteers worked tirelessly to ensure that the festive season truly is the most wonderful time of the year.

PRODUCTIONS & EVENTS

We bring culture to doorsteps by programming a vibrant range of world-class performances in public spaces across Somerset and provide a multitude of opportunities for people of all ages and abilities to perform on our regional stage.

Bringing world-class performances into the heart of our community

- 5 mesmerising outdoor theatre productions, 2 classical music concerts captivating parents & their babies and people living with dementia, 1 enthralling walkabout performance, as well as our enchanting Piano Nights and Acoustic Afternoons.
- Over **26,000 people** from across the county attending cultural events and watching live performances in community locations where they live.
- Over **500 performers** of all ages and abilities taking to our regional stage to perform in our community productions.
- Positive economic impact in locations where events and productions were staged.





One Super Saturday

In 2024, Yeovil's Super Saturday event featured a show-stopping extravaganza – a gigantic 12-foot-tall wheel that left the audience in astonishment! Autin Dance Theatre performed their spellbinding production, *Parade - The* Giant Wheel twice throughout the day. delighting families and shoppers in the heart of Yeovil's Town Centre. The Giant Wheel was rolled through Yeovil, powered by 6 artists and joined by a vibrant community cast. Crowds danced, followed and watched in awe as performers brought the streets to life. It was a joyful, unmissable spectacle that united people of all ages in movement, music and wonder.

The impact was undeniable. The event didn't just unite the community – it reignited the town's vibrancy. The energy was electric as families, shoppers and visitors filled the streets, boosting footfall and giving businesses a welcome lift.



Festivals, Conferences, **Banquets and Meetings**

As a multi-purpose venue, every day at Westlands Entertainment Venue is different. Spend a day at the venue and you'll see a range of different events and activities taking place throughout the day.

- The venue is popular for festivals including the Yeovil Beer and Cider Festival, Somerset Jobs Fair, Christmas Arts & Crafts Market, and Yeovil Together.
- Westlands welcomed corporate events, conferences and banquets for Leonardos and Screwfix, and the Election Count, with banquets including the Funtasia Charity Ball.
- Each month we host around 53 meetings approximately 636 per year.



Across the year we offer a range of opportunities for all ages and abilities to join in, get involved, and take part. From energetic dance sessions to inspiring arts and crafts, participants are encouraged to unleash their creativity and SHINE.

Inspiring the region to take part, get creative and stay active

- Over 7,300 people aged from just 3 months to 90 years took part in activities, classes and workshops at our venue and across the
- 22 weekly participation classes for all ages and abilities, resulting in 1.095 employment hours for local vocational teachers.
- Over 6,500 children, young people and families attended our free Summer and Winter PlayDays held in Yeovil, Wincanton, Langport and Chard.

The summer of 2024 saw us working with local and national organisations and artists to bring FREE creative activities and live theatre to residents, as part of the PlayDay initiative.

During the summer of 2024, we planned a series of four free PlayDays in local parks and recreation grounds in Yeovil, Langport, Wincanton and Chard, to provide young people and their families with the opportunity to unleash their creativity and sense of play. Participants got to create music and play a variety of different instruments from African drums to the ukulele; having a go at spinning plates, juggling and stilt walking; creating no-waste paper plate golden geese, air-drying clay beanstalks and decorating magic beans; with free face painting and activities from Somerset Libraries, Freedom Leisure and others. We also programmed live outdoor theatre productions by national touring theatre companies to entertain, inspire and educate audiences.

The PlayDays provided accessible, high-quality activities and performances on people's doorsteps, with opportunities to try new things, get creative, play together and keep active during the summer holidays. These events were a great way to bring people together, change perceptions on place, and positively impact mental health and wellbeing.

ARTS FOR HEALTH & WELLBEING

Creative activities that provide emotional and physical support to individuals with mental health and long-term health conditions, delivered in partnership with NHS trusts, community organisations and voluntary services.

Projects include:

- Parkinson's Dance in Langport, a creative movement & dance project designed to address the symptoms of Parkinson's.
- Movement Through Cancer in Yeovil, a creative movement & dance project designed for people living with or at any point of their cancer journey.
- **Time Together** in Wincanton, a sensory and creative music-making project aimed at parents feeling low after the birth of their child, delivered in partnership with Bournemouth Symphony Orchestra.
- Somerset Wellbeing Orchestra in Chard, a music-making project aimed at adults who have reported mental health challenges or would like extra support, delivered in partnership with Bournemouth Symphony Orchestra.



Supporting people to live well, live longer and aid their recovery

- Over 100 specialist support-led sessions delivered that support treatment, recovery & long-term wellbeing.
- 146 participants were supported across our health & wellbeing projects.
- ALL participants said the projects are helping them to better manage their health and wellbeing.
- Improving health care professionals understanding of how creative arts can benefit the health and wellbeing of their patients.







Changing lives through creative dance

Bill, who previously had no interest in dance, reluctantly started attending our Parkinson's Dance sessions in Langport one year ago. Now, he never misses a session, as he gains a lot of joy from dancing and has experienced many benefits since. He now feels confident and strong enough to walk without his walking aid and has had fewer trips and falls. Bill's Parkinson's Nurse even said, "keep doing what you are doing Bill – you are doing really well at the moment!" Bill commented he has never heard her say this to him and noted the only change he has made to his life is attending these sessions. His partner said she is so pleased to see him walking and moving easier, and being more sociable, since accessing the Parkinson's Dance project, noting how the sessions have made them both happier and



CREATIVE LEARNING & EDUCATION

We collaborate with schools throughout Somerset to create meaningful opportunities for teachers and students to engage with and be inspired by world-class companies. By working closely with leading creative organisations, we deliver a rich and varied programme that brings learning to life. Our programme involves CPD training that supports and empowers teachers, free in-school workshops for pupils, opportunities for students to watch captivating performances and perform live on our regional stage.

Enriching classroom teaching and broadening familiarity with the arts from a young age


- 16 Somerset primary & secondary schools, delivering dance, theatre and music programmes with Wise Children, Motionhouse Dance and Bournemouth Symphony Orchestra (BSO).
- **800 students** benefitted from creative participation through workshops with inspirational performers and musicians.
- **2,350 students** watched live professional performances.
- **63 teachers** benefitted from CPD training with highly specialist practitioners

TALENTONENT

To support talent and inspire the next generation, we have designed a programme of activity to help young people find their path into the Creative Industries.

Empowering young people to build futures in the creative industries

- 60 secondary school students got to have a go at lighting, sound and stage management, and be producers, directors and performers for the day at our Creative Careers Event.
- Over 1,000 students aged 8–25 learnt about different jobs in the Creative Industries through our Careers Talks delivered to Primary, Secondary and College students in Somerset.
- 27 work experience students got hands-on experience and insight into running a busy receiving and producing venue.
- 3 apprenticeships offered, supporting our Marketing, Technical and Catering teams.
- 1 internship in partnership with Exeter University
- Provided paid on-the-job training experience to 3 local emerging facilitators on our Participation and Arts for Health & Wellbeing programmes.

Supporting local talent

We are proud that our venues are at the heart of the community in Somerset. Many local groups and societies stage performances and events at our venues throughout the year including Castaways Theatre Group, Yeovil Amateur Operatic Society (YAOS), University College Yeovil (Graduation), Helen Laxton School of Dance, Keri Hill Dance, Eminence Dance, Miss Natasha School of Dance, Yeovil Amateur Pantomime Society, Project Play, Project Dance and many more.

ARTSI SUPPORT

We offer support and encouragement for independent professionals and organisations working in all forms of creative practice whether that's visual arts, circus, dance, film, music, opera, photography, poetry, storytelling, theatre, or another artform. To nurture artistic innovation in Somerset and contribute to a sustainable local, regional and national ecology.

Supporting artists to develop lasting creative careers in Somerset

- 200 hours of Free Studio Space for artists to create, rehearse and develop new work.
- 44 artists receiving 1:1 mentoring support and advice.
- 20 Piano Nights & Acoustic Afternoon **sessions** giving paid performance opportunities to 13 local musicians to perform live to over 770 audience members.
- 8 Creative Commissions awarded to local artists & organisations to develop original work that reaches people living in Somerset.
- 21 Artists Blogs and Vlogs showcasing Somerset's creative and cultural practitioners.

ACCESS & INCLUSION

Our Accessible Ticket Scheme, SHiNE Bursary Fund, Octagon Buddies, School Travel Bursary and Octagon & Westlands Inclusion Group. supports individuals of all ages and abilities to attend and take part in, creative participation classes, workshops, theatre shows and events, who might not be able to access the opportunity otherwise.

Our Access Schemes empower individuals in our community to thrive, express their creativity, and feel truly valued and included.

Creating space for everyone to belong and be inspired

- Over 450 tickets at £3 to low-income customers across 20 performances.
- 16 participants supported to attend weekly participation classes through our SHiNE Bursary Fund.
- Free buddy support offered to anyone who feels unable to attend shows and events on their own.
- 7 schools supported with travel costs to enable over 1.890 students to experience the magic of theatre.
- Improving access by actively listening to disabled, D/deaf, and neurodivergent people about barriers they face.

Taking pride in where we live

To share some feedback we received from patrons who have attended shows at our venue thanks to the Accessible Ticket Scheme, 100% of respondents 'strongly agreed' that they felt 'proud of their local theatre for offering the Accessible Ticket Scheme and making theatre more affordable for people on low incomes'. And 100% of those that responded said they would not have been able to attend had they not received £3 tickets through the





We are committed to acting on and responding to the climate emergency. We place sustainability at the heart of decision-making and embed environmental consideration into our daily operations through training, monitoring our energy consumption, and localising our activity across Somerset.



We have made several positive changes by using renewable energy sources and lowering our energy consumption. This year we have reduced our mark in the following ways:

- 54% of tickets were sent as e-tickets, reducing paper waste a positive step up from 49% the previous year.
- 73% of all waste was recycled, supporting circular economy and reducing environmental impact.
- 100% of our waste was diverted from landfill, reinforcing our commitment to responsible disposal practices.
- We partnered with **Carbon Literacy Project,** offering staff accredited training that empowers them to make informed, sustainable decisions in their daily work.
- Over 6,170 people attended our creative PlayDays in **community locations across South Somerset,** bringing arts activities closer to home and reducing the need for travel.
- We source electricity from 100% green energy providers, ensuring every pound we spend supports the development of renewable energy and helps phase out fossil fuels.
- We have established Environment & Sustainability Staff **Champions,** a working group of staff members from each department, which has seen us take a more active stance on promoting environmental consideration both internally and externally.

As a registered charity, they also play a vital role in fundraising for our venues, helping us to continue to thrive.
